Catalan – La Magrana, 2023 272 pages

Literary fiction, contemporary novel, political background, memory, Barcelona, country getaway.

Emili Bayo (Lleida, 1961) published his first novel in 1997, Traïdors i covards, which was followed by La resta del món (Premi Ciutat de Mollerussa), Projecte de felicitat (Premi Projectes Fundació Enciclopèdia Catalana 2010) and L'edat de les paraules (Premi Llorenç Villalonga 2016). Also an author of short stories, in 2015 he won the Premi Crims de Tinta with Puta pasta, and has written the young adults novels Premonicions (2013, Premoniciones, 2020) and Prop de les bombes (Premi Grand Angular 2019). In Spanish he has published the detective novels Tan tuyo como tu muerte (2017) and El mañana sin mí (Premio Valencia de Narrativa 2019 Alfons el Magnànim). Després de la tempesta (2023) is his new novel for adults.

After the Storm

Després de la tempesta

In the post-Spanish Civil War, two cousins forge their destiny growing up as brothers until student movements take over the streets of Barcelona and certain tragic events mark their lives, which will take opposite directions. Three stories flow, just like a river, metaphoric and literally, into the Ebro river delta, an area that has been badly shaken by storm Glòria. A house that holds the memory of a happy past. An old misanthrope at odds with society, a journalist on the run from an abuser and a teenager in conflict with the world. All three seek to recalibrate from the storm that has uprooted their lives. A story full of family secrets, with a political background that unleashes a storm of emotions.



Catalan – L'Altra Editorial, 2023 208 pages

Literary fiction, contemporary novel, climate change, nature, powerful female character.

Ada Castells (Barcelona, 1968) began her career with a novel about her protestant ancestors, *El dit de l'àngel*. She has also published *Mirada*, a novel against the dictatorship of the image; *Tota la vida*, where she narrates the life of the German painter Caspar David Friedrich, and *Pura sang*, with which she won the Sant Joan Unnim Award in 2012. With *Mare* (2019) Castells confirmed that she is one of the most important Catalan-language authors of recent years, something also proved by her latest *Solastàlgia*.

Solastalgia Solastalgia

Sara is a Quixote, obsessed with apocalyptic interpretations and, following extreme floods in Barcelona, decides to flee to the Empordà. She is accompanied on the expedition by a husband who exports chickens to Brazil, a teenage daughter who wants a dog and an eccentric aunt who isn't her responsibility. The aim is to recreate the Middle Ages with 21st century technology. In contact with nature, Sara learns to come to terms with the threat but first she has to overcome deep remorse, a philosophical overdose, fights with her daughter and solastalgia. Love and accepting your own fragility are the only ways out to survive and rebuild bonds with others.



María Codes (Madrid, 1960) has published the novels Los intactos (Pre-textos, 2017, Juan March Cencillo Prize); La peluca de Franklin (2014), La azotea (2009) and Control remoto (2008). She is also the author of the essay on writing Intriga y suspense, El gancho invisible (2013) and the collection of poems Conservar al vacío (2020). She teaches narrative at the Escuela de Escritores and at the José Hierro Foundation in Madrid. A corta distancia is her most recent novel.

At a Short Distance

A corta distancia

"What were the chances of meeting someone again that you had run away from after more than thirty years, both living in the same city?" The attack by a group of far-right thugs on some young university students, which occurred in the Retiro Park in Madrid, ends with the murder of Claudio. Years later, the lives of one of the victims and that of his attacker revolve around a circle of people with whom they share certain ties. As time goes by the distance between the two shortens, friendship and family ties grow closer without their knowing it. A corta distancia intends to honour the indelible memory of José Alcazo Alcazo, assassinated in Madrid in turbulent times.



Literary fiction with historical plot, Second World War, Pyrenees.

Pep Coll (Pessonada, Pallars Jussà, 1949) is the author of the exceptional collection of legends *Muntanyes maleïdes* (1993), but he has excelled above all as a novelist, with titles such as *L'abominable crim de l'Alsina Graells* (1999), *El salvatge dels Pirineus* (2005), *Les senyoretes de Lourdes* (Sant Jordi Award 2007), *Dos taüts negres i dos de blancs* (2013, Premi Crexells de la Crítica, Premi El Setè Cel, Premi Amat-Piniella and Prix Pyrénéen 2016 in the French translation), *En el mateix riu d'Heràclit* (2018) and *L'any que va caure la roca* (2021).

God's Long Nap

La llarga migdiada de Déu

France, May 1940. Samuel Silverstein, a transporter of Jewish origin, finds himself trapped in the exodus of fugitives that Nazi troops are pushing towards the Midi. As a result of a Luftwaffe bombing raid, Silverstein loses everything and begins a new life as an agent for an underground organization working to save Jewish children by hiding them in rural areas. Working as a travelling salesman makes it easy for him to move around the villages and farmhouses of the Ariège valleys. He will soon discover a ruined monastery where dozens of children and adolescents are surviving, under the constant threat of gendarmes under the orders of the Vichy government. While Nazi barbarism devastates Europe and the Jews wait for Yahweh to wake up once and for all, crossing the Pyrenees seems the only escape option. With an energetic and emotional storyline, Pep Coll weaves a novel that, unfortunately, touches us all too closely.



Edmundo Díaz Conde (Orense, 1966) graduated in Law and has worked as an editorial consultant and collaborated, among other publications, with *El Correo de Andalucía* and the cultural magazine *Mercurio*. His first novel, *Jonás el estilita*, won the third City of Badajoz Award in 2000. His next work, *La ciudad invisible*, was a finalist for the XXXIII Ateneo de Sevilla Award. These were followed by *El club de los amantes*, *El veneno de Napoleón* (finalist for the Alfonso X el Sabio Historical Novel Award in 2008), *El príncipe de los piratas* (2013), *El hombre que amó a Eve Paradise* (XLVII Ateneo de Sevilla Novel Award in 2015), *La locura de la señora Bale* (2020), and the most recent *Mamá*.


Mom

Antonio Fontana (Málaga, 1964) is a novelist. With a bachelor's and a master's degree in journalism, his professional career has been linked to the ABC newspaper for thirty years, nineteen as coordinator of the books section of the ABC Cultural supplement, where he has published literary criticism, interviews and articles. He is the author of the novels De hombre a hombre (1997), Hostal Parisién (2011), El perdón de los pecados (finalist of the Café Gijón Prize 2003), Plano detallado del infierno (2007), Sol poniente (Málaga Novel Prize 2017), Hasta aquí hemos llegado (2021, Café Gijón Prize 2020), and his most recent Una mujer furiosa (2023).

A Furious Woman

"So, this is a ghost story. Or, more than of ghosts, perhaps it is a story of disappearances." Santi Alarcón does not know where to start telling us about his childhood. 

Paula Klein (Buenos Aires, 1986) has a PhD in comparative literature and a Bachelor of Arts from the University of Buenos Aires. For years she has lived in Paris, where she is a professor of Latin American literature at the Clermont-Auvergne University. In 2021 she published her first novel, *La luz de una estrella muerta*, as well as the essay *Petites mémoires et écriture du quotidien. Cortázar, Perec et leurs échos contemporains* (PSL-Translitterae edition award). *Las brujas de Monte Verità* is her second novel.

The Witches of Monte Verità

Las brujas de Monte Verità

Verónica is an Argentinian teacher living in Paris who has just had a son with whom she has an ambivalent relationship, marked by unconditional love but also by the feeling that being a mother has broken her freedom. In the midst of this crisis, she decides to investigate a topic that fascinates her, about which she wants to write a book: the lives of women in whom she wants to see herself reflected. They were part of an unknown movement, the creation of a naturist community at the beginning of the 20th century in Switzerland, and which promoted ideas that move us today: feminism, sexual freedom, polyamory and anti-war. They also sought a utopia, they were hippies before 1968, they dedicated themselves to art, dance and literature: they were the witches of Monte Verità. To advance her research project, but also to get away from her home, Verónica undertakes a trip with two friends to the mountains of Ascona. There, a series of discoveries lead her to reflect on her personal situation in an unexpected way.

A hypnotic story that harmoniously combines fiction with an essay about how to build our own freedom, and how the past can illuminate the path to achieve it in the present.

Enrique Llamas (Zamora, 1989) studied Information Sciences in Madrid, where he currently lives. After training in the world of radio in various cultural shows, he has specialized in visual arts communication, a sector in which he has been working for more than a decade. For his first novel, Los Caín (2018), a rural thriller, he received the Silverio Cañada Memorial Prize for best crime novel debut. Todos estábamos vivos (2020), set in the excesses of La Movida in 1980s Madrid, was his second work. Both were nominated for the Castilla y León Critics Prize. Lo nuestro is his most recent novel.

In 1992, the illusion of a country in transformation reached its peak and made us believe that we had achieved everything. But it was not so. That summer, several young people discover the shadows that hide behind everything that glitters. Dazzled by her dreams, Clara, at fourteen, runs away from her home on the outskirts of Madrid and gets on a bus to Barcelona to experience the excitement of the Olympic Games and meet her heroine, Arantxa Sánchez Vicario. Thirtyone-year-old Polo covers the Games as a journalist, convinced that he has a great future ahead of him, and his roommate, Jaime, embarks on what he believes is, finally, adult life. As in all the adventures of youth, their plans, so full of hope, will become that obstacle course full of disappointments that is nothing more than growing up. In Lo nuestro, Enrique Llamas draws a precise, subtle and sensitive portrait of that collective dream that ended up crashing, that implacable truth that is the loss of innocence.




Álvaro Pombo (Santander, 1939) has a degree in Philosophy from the University of Madrid, a Bachelor of Arts from Birkbeck College in London and is a member of the Real Academia Española. He is one of the undisputed masters of contemporary Spanish literature, with titles as prominent as El héroe de las mansardas de Mansard (Premio Herralde 1983), El metro de platino iridiado (Premio de la Crítica 1990), Donde las mujeres (Premio Nacional de Narrativa 1997), La cuadratura del círculo (Premio Fastenrath from the Real Academia Española 2001), El cielo raso (Premio Fundación José Manuel Lara 2002), La fortuna de Matilda Turpin (Premio Planeta 2006) and El temblor del héroe (Premio Nadal 2012). He has also published collections of short stories and articles, and *Protocolos* (1973-2003), which includes his four collections of poems. His work has been translated into multiple languages: German, French, Dutch, Greek, English, Italian, Norwegian and Portuguese. His latest novel is Santander, 1936.

Santander, 1936 Santander, 1936

The main character in this novel, Álvaro Pombo Caller, uncle of the author Álvaro Pombo, was nineteen years old in 1936. As in all of Spain at that time, provincial Santander was alight with leftright confrontations, bitter intellectual debates and exalted political proclamations. Alvarín, with his youthful fervor and his admiration for José Antonio Primo de Rivera, joined the Spanish Falange in 1934. His father, Cayo Pombo Ybarra, an agnostic and Republican liberal, was an admirer of Manuel Azaña. Despite their political differences, father and son loved each other very much and got along very well. Alvarín's mother, Ana Caller Donesteve, the famous Ana de Pombo, highly successful in the Parisian fashion world of the time, has left her husband Cayo in Santander and has distributed her children to English and French boarding schools. There is an intense exchange of letters between Ana and her son Álvaro. The summers Alfonso XIII and his family spent in Santander are in the past as the royal family has left Spain after the proclamation of the Second Republic. The novel highlights the atmosphere of political and intellectual novelty of the Republic, as well as the great turmoil compared to the calmer monarchical times. The beginning of the Civil War will bring tragic consequences to Santander, as in the rest of Spain; also for Álvaro Pombo Caller, a front-line Falangist, who is arrested and imprisoned on the Alfonso Pérez prison ship.

Álvaro Pombo – the writer, not the characterreturns to Santander, to the family universe and to the world of adolescence. He does it with a seductive coming-of-age novel about philosophical and sentimental growth.


Ignacio del Valle (Oviedo, 1971) is the author of the historical thriller series starring Arturo Andrade, made up of El arte de matar dragones, El tiempo de los emperadores extraños – brought to the cinema as Silencio en la nieve-, Los demonios de Berlín, Los días sin ayer and Soles negros, all published by Alfaguara. He is also the author of the novels De donde vienen las olas (1999), El abrazo del boxeador (2001), Cómo el amor no transforma el mundo (2005), Busca mi rostro (2012), Índigo mar (2017), and the book of short stories Caminando sobre las aguas (2013). After Coronado, a splendid foray into the historical genre, he won the Ateneo de Sevilla Prize in 2021 with Cuando giran los muertos. Lo que hicimos por amor is his latest novel.

What We Did For Love Lo que hicimos por amor

We have all done something for love. With all its desires and expectations, with all its uncertainty and its epiphanies, with all its lies and rewards and resentment. With all its happiness. Ignacio del Valle immerses himself in a relationship, the creation of love, its gradual wear and tear, its destruction. Everything is a universal process, imaginary, a daily struggle in which the happiness of two people is resolved. Two voices intersect throughout the novel, with all the accompanying illusion and fatigue. Humor, empathy, rawness. Love, "that feeling of bliss that plunges us into idiocy", as Turgenev defined it so well. Always immeasurable, full of scars. Always full of hope and devastation. The first look, the seduction, the first kiss, the sex. The routine, the little miseries, the daily stress, the economics. The crossroads, the indifference. Endings and silence. Because history repeats itself, but it doesn't look alike. And you come to the conclusion that true happiness, the only one, happens, paradoxically, when you give in, the more exposed you are.



Under the Shadow of the Washingtonia

Barcelona, 1920: according to the statistics, this was the year with the most assassination attempts on factory owners. The Arboix family, owners of a notable textile industrial colony, decided to retreat to their summer house in l'Hospitalet to escape the dangers of the big city. In this atmosphere, laden with family memories, Cecília, the daughter of the house, begins to investigate the secrets of her ancestors' home. A Modernist house, an exotic garden, a mystery to be solved. A captivating evocation of a bygone era and a striking reflection of the weight of a surname. Juanjo Braulio (Valencia, 1972) graduated in Artistic Education from the Sankt Eskils Skola in Eskilstuna (Sweden) and has a degree in Information Sciences from the Polytechnic University of Valencia. He also has a Master's degree in Audiovisual Script Creation from the International University of Valencia. A journalist specialized in political information, he has published a compendium of his opinion columns under the title *La escalera de Jacob*. He is the author of the novels *El silencio del pantano* (2015), made into a film with great success, and *Sucios y malvados* (2017). *En el nombre del poder* is his first ambitious foray into the historical genre.


In the Name of Power En el nombre del poder

Miquel de Corella, feared throughout Italy under the name of Don Micheletto, was born an orphan and a bastard, and will become the executioner of the Borgia household. As if we were seeing the past through a peephole, Corella recounts the dark secrets he kept and the ruthless assignments he carried out during his service under Cardinal Rodrigo de Borgia, the future Pope Alexander VI, later becoming the right-hand man of his son, César Borgia. In the splendid Italy of Botticelli, Michelangelo, Leonardo da Vinci and Machiavelli, art coexists with the most savage crimes, the most daring lies and the most abject betrayals. All of this converges in the story of the Valencian family, for whom, in the name of power or in the name of the Borgias, everything was worth it. They were not the only ones who deceived and killed, but they were the only ones who paid the price of glory with infamy. In this novel, Juanjo Braulio recounts the most controversial and fascinating family epic. With great historical rigor and the rhythm of a thriller, En el nombre del poder reveals the Borgias for what they really were: politicians, then like now, without scruples.

Angels Dalmau (1960) graduated in Contemporary History from the University of Barcelona and is a writer. In 1998, with her first novel, *Habanera*, she was awarded the VIII Luis Berenguer International Novel Prize. She has collaborated with various media and as a lecturer and teacher, has given numerous seminars on the talent of women through history. *Vinyes de sang* is her latest novel.





A contributor to various media, such as La Vanguardia, Revista de Letras, Quimera, Mercurio or Crátera, she is also a lecturer. In 2017, she was awarded the first prize for narrative by the General Directorate of the Valencian Institute for Women and Gender Equality, with the work Calle Progreso 36, se vende. She is the author of two legal essays and a wonderful book about Greek mythology: Eso no estaba en mi libro de mitología griega (Almuzara, 2021). La dama blanca is her first novel.

On the 50th anniversary of the death of J.R.R. Tolkien, Alicia García-Herrera has written an exciting novel that reveals the origin of one of the greatest literary phenomena of the 20th century: *The Lord of the Rings*.

The Somme, October 1916. After the attack on the Regina trench, signal officer J. R. R. Tolkien falls ill with Quintana fever. Daniel Hernández Chambers (Tenerife, 1972) graduated in English from the University of Alicante and is one of the most relevant YA authors in Spanish. He was a finalist for the Gran Angular Prize in 2006 with his first novel, La ciudad gris, and again the following year in the same contest with El enigma Rosenthal. In 2012 he won the Everest Prize with Un fragmento de noche en un frasco. These are just some of the various prizes that his extensive and well-known work dedicated to children and young people has earned, whose latest titles are Historias de miedo en el faro (finalist of the Edebé Prize 2022) and Accomplices (Algar, 2022). After the sci-fi title Memoria herida (2019), El secreto del bosque is his first crime novel.

The Secret of the Woods El secreto del bosque

Hardly anyone knew the Moreña woods like Carolina, which is why she discovered the perfect place so they wouldn't find her when they played hide-and-seek. 

He has participated in the creation of the Royal Academy of History's Spanish Biographical Dictionary. He has also been recognized with several awards in literature, history and journalism. A brilliant chemist, on sick leave due to depression, has lost his mind from reading the adventures of Sherlock Holmes so much and has convinced himself that he is the famous Victorian detective. One fine morning, the former mayor of Madrid, Ana Botella, contacts him to request his services: the former president Aznar has disappeared and she does not want to notify the police, for reasons that she will reveal to him in a private conversation. The "fake" Watson tries to convince the "fake" Holmes not to accept the assignment, as he defends that Aznar is a toxic figure in Spanish society and it is better that he has vanished forever. The case, however, seems tailor-made for the Spanish Holmes: it is apparently simple, but it is full of those details that put his deductive abilities to the test. But as he goes deeper into the investigation, the other Holmes finds himself faced with a mystery that challenges even his astonishing detective skills, forcing him to enlist the help of a mind even more enlightened than his own: that of his brother, Mycroft Holmes. The final outcome will leave the reader as stupefied as that of his first adventure, El hombre que fue Sherlock Holmes, awarded in 2020 with the Jaén Novel Prize.



Jesús Sánchez Adalid (Don Benito, 1962) is one of the most relevant Spanish historical authors, and you can usually find his books on the bestseller lists since his El mozárabe (2001). He studied and served as a judge for two years, after which he studied Philosophy and Theology. He has received important awards such as the Fernando Lara Award 2007 for El alma de la ciudad, the Alfonso X el Sabio 2012 for Alcazaba, the City of Zaragoza 2011 for his career or the Arcobaleno Award 2017 granted in Italy by the "Bottega dell'Arte". His historical subjects vary from the first years of the Christianity, the 16th century, the coexistence of the Christianity, Islam and Judaism during the Middle Ages or even the Second World War in his last novel. His latest titles, published with great success by HarperCollins Ibérica, are Los baños del pozo azul (2018), Las armas de la luz (2021), and Una luz en la noche de Roma (2023)

A Light in the Night of Rome

Una luz en la noche de Roma

In the summer of 1943, after the bizarre fall of Mussolini, Italy is exhausted by the war and the megalomaniac excesses of the fascist regime. Gina is a young and beautiful student from a wealthy family who begins to be interested in anti-fascist movements. With this novel, the reader will travel to that exciting year 1943 to discover the Rome occupied by the Nazis and the most beautiful story of love, heroism and generosity that can be found in the hectic 20th century.



She has worked as a journalist and literary translator, and in 2014 she published a collaborative work, *Corona de damas*, under a pseudonym, a thriller with a historical setting. *El ladrón de veranos* is her first solo novel.

She is the author of three books: the fictional biography Azules son las horas (2016), the anthology of interviews with writers Una habitación compartida (2020) and the children's story Giselle (2020), based on the ballet of the same name. She has prefaced works by authors such as David Foster Wallace, Virginia Woolf and Carmen Laforet. In 2019, she was selected by the Spanish Agency for International Cooperation for Development (AECID) in the program 10 of 30, which each year recognizes the best Spanish writers under forty. Her novel Las formas del querer was awarded the Premio Nadal 2022. Una homosexualidad propia is her latest title.

Translated into several languages, he is also the author of short stories, poems and essays such as his acclaimed and reissued Mapa secreto del bosque (2019). A well-known and respected radio broadcaster in his native country, he is a knight of the Order of the Finnegans, and a member of the National System of Art Creators of Mexico. After his unclassifiable essay La orilla celeste del agua (2021) and his incomparable novel Los hijos del volcán, he returns to the essay with La resquebrajadura (2023).

The FissureLa resquebrajadura

"There is a crack in everything, that's how the light gets in," say the lyrics of a famous song. Perhaps, more than a crack, it is a chink, or even, a fissure, since that word suggests that something is broken without actually breaking; that this solid thing has a leak through which the darkness comes out so that a portion, even a minimal one, of light can enter. This Buddhist sounding idea that appears in the song "Anthem", by Leonard Cohen, tells us, on one hand, that total darkness does not exist and, on the other, that anything, no matter how solid it seems, always has a fissure through which it opens to the outside. This fissure that all things have, including people, serves as an entrance and an exit and, moreover, defines our imperfection. The perfection of a body would be imperceivable if it did not have a single counterpoint of imperfection. Just as darkness would be invisible without a particle of light.
